

## Former Coach Sends Academic Team to State History Bowl

When a former academic team coach found out this year's team needed money in order to attend invitational tournaments, he came up with the idea of "sponsoring" the team for certain tournaments and agreed to sponsor the team for the State History Bowl. Fred Klug coached the team from 2001 until 2012. After 2016, the team disbanded for a short time, but the team is back and doing great things to put Holy Spirit on the guiz bowl map once again. New coach and first year Latin teacher Leah Clark is a former member of Klug's team and former varsity captain. She asked Mr. Klug for his advice on how to raise money to pay for tournaments, which generally cost between 75 and 100 dollars and well, the rest is "history!" "I have a special place in my heart for the History Bowl," said Mr. Klug. "I took our 2011 team to the state tournament and we qualified for nationals in Washington, D.C. We ended up taking only three team members and competed against four-person teams. That team of Joseph Latham, Ian Ramdeen, and Satchell Watts-Kerr finished 16th out of 120 teams and represented our school and our state very well!" Mr. Klug is hoping the idea of tournament sponsorship will catch on and give our new coach and team members less to worry about in terms of fundraising. 




Before their season was halted, the Lady Saints Tennis Team won their first match of the season against ACA.
